
Enthusiasm in support of the project was high, so much so that the Lindenwood Development Office happily received a naming opportunity gift during the event.

Shooting Coach Headed to World Championships; Women's Wrestler Too

Two Lindenwood representatives won championships last week at national competitions and both will now represent the United States at the World Championships in their respective sports.

Women's wrestler Tatiana Padilla won the 121-pound weight class at the U.S. World Team Trials on Saturday and advances to the Women's Freestyle Wrestling World Championships, which will be held on Oct. 11-13 in Tokyo, Japan.

Four Lindenwood shooters competed at the United States Shooting Fall Selection competition, but it was their head coach that stole the headlines. Sean Dulohery, pictured at right, won the International Skeet competition,



Dulohery led the event from the start after hitting 99 of 100 targets during Day One of the event. He then held off a late surge by Hancock on the final day of action.

Lindenwood Olympian Sean McLelland also advanced to the finals of that competition and finished sixth overall with a score of 255. Alexander Chiang tied for sixth in the women's shoot with a score of 225 and lost in a shootout to miss advancing to the finals.

Daniel Boone Home to Host Evening of Kentucky Music

The Historic Daniel Boone Home and Boonesfield Village will present "An Evening of Kentucky Music" from 7-9 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 11, in the Old Peace Chapel. The show will feature William and Becky Ray, with special guest Colin Blair.

Traditional music will intertwine with offerings from modern Appalachian songwriters to paint a vivid picture of Kentuckian music in the 21st century. The old-time banjo will be bolstered by harmonies from the guitar, mountain dulcimer, mandolin, and upright bass. An emphasis will be placed on what the Boone family would have known as "fiddle tunes" and "singin' songs."

Lindenwood employees must provide their Group Health Plan (GHP) insurance cards, which the VNA will submit directly to GHP. Those not covered by GHP may pay the \$21 fee by cash or by check made payable to Lindenwood University.

Inaugural Edition of *Untamed Ink* is Celebrated with Party

Lindenwood celebrated the release of its new literary journal, *Untamed Ink"* on the evening of Tuesday, September 16, in Sibley Chapel. An appreciative crowd gathered to listen to readings by journal contributors and to be among the first to get copies of the new book.

The journal, which will be published annually in the fall, is 96 pages and contains 29 poems and 5 short stories. Contributors include Lindenwood faculty Michael Castro, Spencer Hurst (pictured), Eve Jones, and editors Michael Fetters and Alexander Balogh, as well as renowned St. Louis-area writer Howard Schwartz and famed Hungarian poet Gabor Gyukics.



"We hatched the idea for the journal to fill a void," Balogh said.

"Lindenwood hadn't had one in 10 years. We wanted to do something of a nationwide quality that people would be interested in picking up outside of the St. Louis area."

The name of the journal has to do with freedom of thought and expression, Balogh said.

"It has many themes throughout," Balogh said. "It should appeal to writers and anyone looking for a good read."

Balogh said he and Fetters began receiving submissions for the journal about a year ago, nine months after they submitted the proposal for the publication.
