## EDUCATIONAL STRENGTH.

The educational strength of a college is its teaching force.

Lindenwood College for Women has always had a corps of teachers of the highest grade. The faculty for the year 1914-1915 has been strengthened over that of any previous year. Each member is a graduate of a standard College or University. Several members hold post-graduate degrees.

The work of the College is accepted hour for hour by all other Colleges and Universities of the Mississippi Valley. This fact places the scholarship and teaching power of our faculty beyond a question.

The coming year there will be three new teachers, Miss Clare Agnes Berry, graduate with honors in Washington University and a teacher of experience will have charge of the Department of English, Miss Mildred Fontaine of Oxford and Chevy Chase, the School of Expression, and Miss Myrtle McDaniels, of the James Milliken University, the Domestic Science.

An announcement of great interest to the educational world is that of the connection of Dr. Samuel Monds Coulter with Lindenwood the coming year as special lecturer in the sciences. Dr. Coulter has a nation-wide reputation as an educator, and his work as a botanist deserves the fame accorded it in our great universities. He and his wife will live in Margaret Hall.
