#### Three Teams at Nationals; Baseball, Softball Fall Just Short

Three Lindenwood teams are at their national competitions this week. The highest-ranked team is men's golf, which is ranked eighth in the country heading into the nationals. The golfers will tee it up against the best in the NAIA Tuesday through Friday. Men's tennis is in action today in the first round of the NAIA Tournament. The Lions are facing Lewis-Clark State in the first round. The third team is the men's lacrosse, which starts the MCLA Tournament on Tuesday. Lindenwood will face top seed Michigan in the opening game of the tournament.

Last week, the Lindenwood baseball and softball squads saw their seasons end at NAIA Regional Tournaments. The baseball tournament, unfortunately, was not decided on the field as rain halted the event before its conclusion. Lindenwood had reached the championship contest versus Missouri Baptist, but the game was called in the 9th inning with the score tied 5-5. Because the tournament was unable to finish, Missouri Baptist advanced due to being the higher seed. Lindenwood concludes its season with 40 wins, marking the fourth straight season it has hit that impressive mark. The softball team also had to fight bad weather and tough competition at its tournament in southwest Missouri. The young Lady Lions team lost both of its regional games and was eliminated. Lindenwood finishes the softball year with 35 wins, an improvement of 19 over the 2007 season.
