ANNOUNCING— Semester Studies in Hungary or Poland

The United States Information Agency (USIA) and the Institute of International Education (IIE) have announced a new scholarship program enabling U.S. undergraduate students to spend a semester abroad studying in either Hungary or Poland.

The scholarships are part of the 'Samantha Smith' Memorial Exchange Program established in memory of the young Maine schoolgirl whose visit to the Soviet Union focused world attention on East-West relations.

To be eligible, applicants should be U.S. citizens under 21 years of age with

at least one and preferably two years of undergraduate education at the time of application with a 3.2 cumulative GPA. The program is open to all fields of study.

Students will be placed at selected Hungarian or Polish universities for one, four-month semester. Scholarships will include an allowance for round-trip international travel, tuition and fees at the students' host universities; a monthly stipend; and an allowance for in-country travel, which will allow students to travel, meet, and interact with host country nationals.

Application deadline is October 31, 1989.

We are open for your ideas on a new name until September 30, 1989--

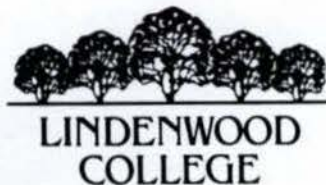
