There are generations of people in the United States who know as little about the People's Republic of China as they do about the Moon, and who were as intrigued with Nixon's trip to "Red China" as they were with Armstrong's "moon walk."

Because of this mystery, a great deal of interest has been generated by the "Exhibition of Archaeological Finds of the People's Republic of China," funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, which will be in Kansas City at the Nelson Gallery-Atkins Museum from April 20 through June 8, said Harry Hendren, chairman of the Lindenwood Art Department.

The Lindenwood Colleges are taking advantage of the Exhibition in two ways. Late in April, art and sociology classes from Lindenwood will be going to Kansas City to see the exhibition. Prior to that, on April 2, Mrs. Lindsay Cooper from the Nelson Gallery-Atkins Museum will be on the Lindenwood campus talking about the exhibition. She will speak in the Fine Arts Building at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, April 2.

Mrs. Cooper is a lecturer, writer, art scholar, and world traveler. She has been Gallery Assistant and Assistant Curator at the Nelson Gallery-Atkins Museum, and is now Special Assistant to the Director. She earned her bachelor of arts degree from the University of Missouri, attended The Lindenwood Colleges, and has done special study at Harvard College, Princeton Graduate College, and the University of Chicago. Her fields of study include Chinese and Japanese art, Japanese history, Chinese civilization and language, and Islamic culture. In connection with the Chinese Exhibition, Mrs. Cooper is lecturing on Chinese art and history through the cooperating efforts of the Missouri State Council on the Arts.

Her lecture will be free and is open to the public.
